Nursery manager

Early years educator, pre-school manager

Nursery managers run early years childcare centres, providing day care for babies and young children from birth to 5 years.

Salary: £23,000 to £45,000 average per year

Hours: 35 to 40 per week

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1. Entry requirements

You'll usually need:

- a <u>full and relevant</u> level 3 qualification in childcare
- level 2 qualifications in English and maths (including functional skills)
- 2 years' work experience with children in a nursery setting
- · experience of supervising or managing staff

Some smaller nurseries may prefer you to have a degree or early years teacher status (EYTS).

You could work your way up from a nursery worker role to a room leader or '3rd in charge' role to get supervisory experience.

You'll also need an enhanced background check which your employer will arrange for you.

2. Skills required

You'll need:

• excellent communication skills

- · the ability to motivate and support staff
- · problem-solving skills
- the ability to use your own judgement to make decisions
- organisational skills
- financial management skills
- IT skills

3. What you'll do

You could work for a local authority, a privately owned nursery or a Sure Start Children's Centre.

Your day to day tasks could include:

- creating a safe and stimulating environment to promote learning
- updating parents and carers on children's progress
- working with colleagues to meet children's needs
- · checking equipment is in good condition

Your business responsibilities will often include:

- recruiting staff
- supporting and developing the nursery team
- · managing a budget
- arranging marketing materials
- · keeping records and creating management reports
- working within environmental, health and safety and fire regulations
- keeping up to date with developments in early years care
- building relationships with parents, carers, schools and childcare professionals

You'll also work with the nursery owner to make sure it meets Ofsted and early years foundation stage standards.

4. Salary

Starter: £23,000 to £28,000

Experienced: £30,000 to £35,000

Highly Experienced: up to £45,000

These figures are a guide.

5. Working hours, patterns and environment

Nurseries are often open from around 7am to 6pm.

You'll usually work up to 8 hours a day. You may also have to work Saturdays and some evenings to cover events like parents evenings.

6. Career path and progression

With experience, you could become an area manager and look after the work of a number of nurseries. You might also consider setting up your own private nursery. <u>Ofsted</u> have information on how to do this.

You could become a trainer or training assessor for people studying for childcare qualifications. You could also move into inspection.

Taking a higher education qualification in early years or child development could help you move into teaching, children's nursing or social work.
